

20. One-Tour Workshop-cum- Tour at SAGG ECO Village, Ganderbal 29th June, 2025

As part of its emphasis on experiential and activity-based learning, the department organized a field visit to Sagg Eco Village, Ganderbal, for the 2nd Semester students of BS-DYOD on 29th May 2025. The visit was conceived under the broader pedagogical vision of the university's Wellness Basket and aligned with the Self-Improvement and Personal Effectiveness course module.

Rooted in the belief that natural ecological settings can function as powerful pedagogical spaces, this initiative sought to deepen student







The visit included a session titled Activating the Regenerative *Mindset Blueprint*, led by Fayaz Ahmad Dar, award-winning ecological entrepreneur and founder of Sagg. This interactive session challenged students to consider leadership as an inward journey and helped them reflect on resilience, motivation, and personal alignment. While the session served as a graded component for students formally enrolled in the Self-Improvement module, the visit also welcomed other second-semester students from the cohort. Their inclusion reflected a commitment to

inclusive educational exposure and **emotional well-being**, offering an opportunity to engage with nature, traditional games, and peer interaction.

The day unfolded across various dimensions of engagement — students explored traditional Kashmiri architectural techniques using bamboo and mud, interacted with handmade objects and cultural artifacts, and learned about Sagg Eco Village's nationally recognized contributions to



sustainable tourism and ecological innovation. During the afternoon's unstructured session for the students, the physical playfulness of swinging on traditional jhullas, walking through village pathways, and sharing informal moments with peers added a layer of grounding and joy that deepened the reflective tone of the experience.

The presence of four faculty members — Dr. Shahkar A. Nahvi, Dr. Asif Ali Banka, Dr. Inayat Rasool, and Mr. Taha Mughal — enabled a rich, interdisciplinary facilitation of the visit. Their combined engagement allowed themes of design, ecology, wellness, and cultural heritage to emerge not as separate elements, but as a holistic learning experience. However, the diversity of student involvement also surfaced meaningful challenges. While the mixed-group format fostered inclusivity and community, some students formally enrolled in the course expressed that the content felt repetitive and touched upon themes they already knew. This underscored the importance of differentiated pedagogical strategies within shared learning spaces and offered an opportunity to reflect on the fluid boundaries between curricular and co-curricular education.

The visit to Sagg Eco Village resonates deeply with the goals outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and contributes to global educational imperatives, including the UN Sustainable Development Goals—particularly those focused on good health and well-being, quality education, and sustainable communities. It reaffirmed the department's belief that students flourish when given the space to engage with the world beyond textbooks, and that real-world immersion strengthens not only academic understanding but also emotional and ethical maturity.

Looking ahead, the department sees value in formalizing such visits within the curriculum and exploring faculty capacity-building around activity-based and field-integrated pedagogy. The visit stands as a testament to the transformative power of thoughtful, place-based pedagogy and reflects the department's continued commitment to student-centered education through.

Demonstrating rhetorical clarity and historical insight, the student effectively countered emotionally charged attacks by reframing the discussion around lived political experiences and the responsibility of civic discourse.

This participation underscores DYOD's commitment to shaping articulate, socially aware individuals equipped to engage with the



challenges and responsibilities of democratic life. The Youth Parliament formed a core part of the week-long series of civic, cultural, and intellectual activities under VBYCP, leading up to the main event on **24th July 2025**, graced by the Hon'ble Lieutenant Governor and Chancellor of IUST.


